

Founded in 1959 in response to an appeal from South Africa to boycott South African goods, the Anti-Apartheid Movement is the only organisation that exists in Britain to fight apartheid on all fronts.

SANCTIONS NOW

The AAM is in the forefront of the campaign to isolate South Africa. With nearly two hundred local groups around Britain, the AAM has organised action against South African interests all around the country.

Opinion polls have shown that the majority of British people support the call for sanctions. Nelson Mandela has a message for British trade unionists: "The struggle against apartheid must continue until apartheid is finally dismantled. Let us intensify the campaign for sanctions until final victory is won".

But the British Government has stubbornly refused to answer this call, and has already dropped some sanctions. But sanctions remain a vital means of pressure until fundamental and irreversible change has been carried out in South Africa. It is apartheid that must go.

STOPPING APARTHEID REPRESSION

The AAM has a long record of campaigning for all those facing repression under apartheid. The AAM's Campaign Against the Repression of Trade Unionists in South Africa and Namibia has led campaigning in the trade union movement.

The AAM has:

- campaigned for the release of trade union leader Moses Mayekiso and trade union veterans Harry Gwala and Oscar Mpetha;
- mounted campaigns to save the lives of all trade unionists on death row;
- organised opposition amongst British trade unions to the introduction of anti-trade union legislation in South Africa.

SOLIDARITY WITH SOUTH AFRICAN WORKERS

Trade unions in South Africa have made massive strides forward. These advances have been made in the face of opposition from the apartheid regime and South African employers. Unions organised under the banner of the Congress of South Africa Trade Unions (COSATU) are a central element of the national liberation movement headed by the African National Congress. They support the Freedom Charter, the ANCs blueprint for a new South Africa.

The AAM promotes political, moral and material support from British trade unions for the ANC, and for COSATU and its affiliates. By strengthening the non-racial democratic trade union movement, we are advancing the day of freedom in South Africa.

FOR A UNITED, NON-RACIAL AND DEMOCRATIC SOUTH AFRICA


The South African people are on the road to freedom. But many struggles still lie ahead until they achieve their vision of a new South Africa - united, non-racial and democratic.
