AFTER BOIPATONG

The tragic massacres of 18 and 20 June have exposed to the world the continuing reality of apartheid South Africa. The ANC has withdrawn from the talks and has called for the following:-

- International monitoring of the violence.
- Release of all the political prisoners forthwith.
- An International Commission of Enquiry into the Boipatong Massacre and all acts of violence.
- The immediate establishment establisment of an Interim Government of National Unity.
- A democratically elected and sovereign Constituent Assembly to draft and adopt a new Constitution.

The international anti-apartheid movement immediately responded to the ANC calls for solidarity by organising protests and putting pressure on Governments. Here in Birmingham we have had a number of protests in the town centre so far at which we have been collecting signatures on a local petition.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

■ Write a letter to your MP and to the Rt. Hon Douglas Hurd MP, Foreign Secretary, Foreign and Commonwealth Office, Downing Street, London SW1. Demand that the British Government abandon its support for De Klerk, oppose any white veto over Constitutional change; and to support an immediate Interim Government and Constituent Assembly, international monitoring of the violence and re-imposition of economic sanctions.

AUGUST 3 SOUTH AFRICAN GENERAL STRIKE

On August 3 the Confederation of South African Trade Unions (COSATU) has called a 5 day general strike to pressurise the government of President De Klerk to end the violence in the townships and to hand over power to an Interim Government. COSATU, the largest South African trade union federation, has given the apartheid state 6 months to move to a meaningful transfer of power to the black majority population or face massive disruption to the economy.
