

Support women in South Africa – campaign for free and fair elections!

ORE THAN HALF of those eligible to vote in South Africa's first ever non-racial election on 27–28 April are women. For the election to be free and fair every woman must know how to use her vote. She must be able to cast it for the party of her choice without pressure from her husband, chief or employer and without fear of violence.

But over 70% of African women live in rural areas or bantustans and more than half of rural women cannnot read or write. Some women have been told they will lose their pensions or jobs if they vote the wrong way and in some areas they are afraid of being attacked or killed.

South Africa is a deeply sexist society. Women who are employed do the worst paid jobs. Women who live in rural areas have no legal access to land. African women married under customary laws have the legal status of minors. Women have little control over their bodies; contraception is hard to get, abortion is illegal and rape and violence against women are commonplace.

South Africa's new constitution pledges equal rights for all. The electoral code of conduct places an obligation on political parties to ensure that women can use their votes freely. The ANC has made a start by nominating women as more than 25% of its candidates for the National Assembly. Its Manifesto promises women equal rights to land, opportunities as traders, access to education and maternity and child care rights.
